

Materials: Pencil, eraser, canvas board, silk Poinsettia flower

Directions:

Today you will be drawing from observation! Look at the Poinsettia and draw what you see!

1. Start with the seeds at the center

2. Then draw the petals around the outside edge!

Most Poinsettia have 6 large slightly pointed petals.

Some have some smaller petals as well.

Be sure to include the veins in the center of the petals for detail!

Today we will be painting the Poinsettia flower petals using acrylic paints and the blending technique!

We will paint the seed and background next week!

Materials: Water cups, paint palette, brushes, paper towels, red and white acrylic paints, canvas boards

- 1. Start with the first petal at the top of your flower.
- 2. Continue to paint each petal working your way down the canvas, one petal at a time.

Tips:

*Use blending to create a 3D look.

More white=pinkish petals

Less white=red petals

*Acrylic paint should be thick and stick not watery like watercolors

*Rinse your brush and dry it on the paper towel thoroughly between colors




Georgia O'Keeffe

- Georgia D'Keeffe studied art at the Art Institute of Chicago and the Art Students League.
- She is famous for revolutionizing art.
- Her paintings portrayed the emotion and power of objects of nature.
- The piece that brought Georgia her fame was charcoal drawings of silhouetted bud-like forms in 1916.





- Georgia O'Keeffe was born on November 15, 1887 in Sun Prairie, Wisconsin.
- Her ancestors were Irish and Hungarian and her family were farmers.
- Georgia grew up in Sun Prairie as well as Williamsburg, Virginia.











- After the death of Georgia's husband, her painting's became less inspiring as time went on.
- During her lifetime, Georgia was the first retrospective show of a woman's art at the Museum of Modern Art.
- She was also awarded the Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor.



Today we will be painting the Poinsettia seeds and the background using acrylic paints and the blending technique!

We will paint the seed and background next week!

Materials: Water cups, paint palette, brushes, paper towels, red, green and white acrylic paints, canvas boards

1. Start with the seeds at the center of the flower.

Take your time and focus on getting the seeds to look round by blending and using a small brush!

2. Finally paint each section in the background with green paint, I working your way down the canvas, one area at a time.

Tips:

*Use blending to create a 3D look.

Try using all 3 colors to create the 3D look of the seeds.

*Use the red to make the top half of the seed and then green on the bottom side as a darker shadow color.

- *Add White as a highlight last
- *Acrylic paint should be thick and stick not watery like watercolors
- *Rinse your brush and dry it on the paper towel thoroughly between colors
